

Final OWG Outcome Document, July 19

- 1. End **poverty** in all its forms everywhere
- 2. End <u>hunger</u>, achieve food security and improved nutrition, and promote sustainable agriculture
- 3. Ensure **healthy lives** and promote well-being for all at all ages
- 4. Ensure inclusive and equitable **quality education** and promote life-long learning opportunities for all
- 5. Achieve **gender equality** and empower all women and girls
- 6. Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all
- 7. Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all
- 8. Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable <u>economic growth, full and productive employment</u> and decent work for all
- 9. Build <u>resilient infrastructure</u>, promote inclusive and <u>sustainable industrialization</u> and foster innovation

Final OWG Outcome Document, July 19

- 10. Reduce inequality within and among countries
- 11. Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- 12. Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns
- 13. Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts
- 14. Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development
- 15. Protect, restore and promote sustainable use of <u>terrestrial ecosystems</u>, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss
- 16. Promote <u>peaceful and inclusive societies</u> for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels
- 17. Strengthen the <u>means of implementation</u> and revitalize <u>the global partnership</u> for sustainable development

Measuring innovation for global health in the post-2015 development agenda

R&D is central to achieving the health aims of the SDGs

Analysis shows that nearly half of the 19 SDG targets representing the best value-for-money are health targets (8)

Many health targets (e.g. reducing TB globally by 90%) cannot not be achieved without R&D of new health technologies




... but R&D is at risk of being completely ignored in the SDGs

R&D is almost entirely absent from the SDGs and the proposed SDG indicators

- R&D for 'health needs of DCs' is mentioned in one of the 169 targets (Target 3.b), but is confused with access
- Essentially absent from indicator proposals (including for the 'global health R&D' target above)




A crowded (and contested) space

The aim of the project

To identify a *small* number of health R&D indicators that should be included in the SDG global monitoring framework

- Feasible, suitable and relevant to the target
